The <u>Early Childhood Regional Networks Fund (ECRN Fund)</u> is a philanthropic pooled funding initiative launched in June 2022 that empowers ECD networks to be strong, resilient and representative organisations, able to connect the reality on the ground to the national, regional and global agendas that determine how early childhood is prioritised, integrated and funded.

Currently, the ECRN Fund supports networks operating at the regional level, who nurture cross-sectoral working groups and incubate national ECD networks, facilitate the learning and exchange between practitioners and stakeholders working at the frontlines, and foster a movement of advocates that together help to align early childhood outcomes so that ECD continues to play a prominent role in the wider development agenda.

Annual Meeting Objectives & Overview

This meeting brings together key ECD actors, including funders and networks, to share updates and explore challenges and opportunities in the context of a shifting ECD landscape. By the end of the annual meeting, we aim to have:

- Deepened our understanding of the unique role that regional and global ECD networks play to catalyse and facilitate sector learning, development and action by exploring network mechanisms and the role and importance of networks in advancing ECD outcomes.
- Outlined tangible ideas for how networks and the ECRN Fund can move the agenda forward on two themes: male engagement in early childhood, and young children in crisis.

"Networks are uniquely powerful vehicles for achieving ambitious goals. Grantmakers for Effective Organizations observed that networks "hold the potential for generating impact at scale exponentially greater than the sum of their individual parts." Through their connections, networks can assemble and activate diverse people, gather and communicate vital information, develop and scale innovative solutions, influence policy and practice across sectors and confer legitimacy by engaging actors at all levels. A network's unique ability to organise for increased impact is called the network advantage ." – from the report by Network Impact, which we encourage you to read ahead of the meeting: <u>The Network Advantage - How Regional Networks Catalyze Impact in Early Childhood Development</u> . During this session, we will dive into the network mechanisms that allow ECD networks to catalyse impact for young children, looking at recent examples from the four regional networks that have been supported by the ECRN Fund.
